

Wes Hinkle has been a board member since 2011 and is in charge of the Street Committee. His patriotism runs deep as he served 33 years in the Marine Corps and retired as a Colonel. The flags will be displayed during daylight hours at our community park in honor of those who have and do bravely serve our country. The Holidays they are scheduled to be out are New Years Day, President's Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Patriots Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving and Election Days. As soon as our streets are put back to normal this tradition will continue.

Too Close For Comfort—

We have had not only coyotes but rattlesnakes attacking and killing neighborhood pets. In one instance the coyote scaled a 6 foot block wall from the canyon in broad daylight in the middle of the afternoon.

And just last month a coyote bit a woman on her calf while jogging in Kensington.

In the year 1983 in Los Angeles, a coyote attacked a three year old girl and killed her while she was playing outside - so take these animals seriously.

And just this year alone attacks have been on the rise around the country. A coyote attacked a man and his dog walking on the CU-Boulder campus.. The man reported that after focusing on them for some time, the coyote approached and eventually attacked his dog. The dog was on a leash and the man was able to pull the dog away from the attack.

The coyote then lunged at the man, biting his left forearm as he reached out to block the coyote's advance. The man was able to fend off the attack by kicking the coyote and swinging a stick as it retreated.

It's also important to make sure you aren't leaving food or trash out that could attract coyotes or the animals they prey on.

If a Coyote Approaches You:

- Do not run or turn your back
- Be as big and loud as possible
- Wave your arms and throw objects
- Face the coyote and back away slowly
- If attacked, fight back

Protect Your Pets:

- Keep pets on a short leash
- Use extra caution dusk through dawn
 - Avoid known or potential den sites and thick vegetation
 - Do not allow dogs to interact with coyotes


Be Prepared - If You Have Concerns About an Encounter:

- Recreate during daylight hours
- Walk with a walking stick
- Keep a deterrent spray handy
- Carry noise makers or rocks to throw

Regarding safety, please be advised that several members have reported suspicious activity in the neighborhood. Specifically, a middle aged Caucasian male with dark hair riding a bicycle and trespassing on properties. His name is Chris and he asks for work as a window washer. Once he has been in your house, and seen all the doors, windows and where you keep your things, he has made you vulnerable. He has also been known to ring door bells and asks to use your phone. **Do not let him in your house under any circumstances!** It is advised that we all be

aware of the people in our community, refrain from hiring people who solicit door to door, and call the police if you witness any criminal activity.

While it has been a couple of months since we have had any thefts and/or vandalism in our neighborhood we need to remain vigilant by keeping our houses and car doors locked. We want to encourage all homeowners along the rim of the canyon, to utilize motion detector lights to help thwart any prowlers. We must educate our neighbors and their guests to not leave any valuables within sight inside vehicles parked over night on the streets. 
Rebate Programs—Steve Neu

There are two programs that offer rebates for removing lawns. I took advantage of both of them. They pay \$2 a sq ft each for replacing the turf with low water use plants. In my case I used a combination of rock and shrubs. You need to get approval BEFORE starting. In the case of the city program they will come out and measure and inspect before and after the project is done. The regional program is okay with pictures of the before and after.

The web sites do still say the lawn being replaced needs to be "green" but they have done away with that requirement—so don't bother with fixing up your lawn if you intend to get the rebates.

I believe the city won't pay for synthetic grass—but the SoCal program will for those that want to go that route.



Water Costs Skyrocketing!

We're well into the new year and still praying for rain. Given the current and probably future water situation, many of our neighbors are installing irrigation meters, separate from their house water meters. The major benefits are that there is no sewer charge attached to the meter and the water used is billed at a flat rate that is close to the lowest tier price we are all paying on our regular meters, rather than a multi-tier pricing structure. Like death and taxes, we can all count on water rates going up so I encourage anyone that is interested to contact Susan Crisafulli at scc@FUN-damentals.com or 224-0400. Along those lines, you should consider replacing thirsty plantings with more water-wise ones. Remember, water-wise does not mean a desert landscape. There are many plants that while providing a comparable lush green look, require much less water once established, than many of the plants that we have typically used. Feel free to let me know if you would like more info.
